



One Rescue's Path to Slowing the Spread of **Disease & Overpopulation**

ounded in October 2019 by animal advocate Stefanie Seitz, Pathways for Paws (PfP) is a 501(c)(3) non-profit, no-kill, animal welfare organization here in Tucson that you might recognize from their vaccine and microchip clinics. They began, however, as a canine rescue with a strong desire to see more spay and neuter procedures being performed in the area.

Currently, their mission is to promote vaccines and low-cost microchipping to the community and to reinforce their message regarding the importance of spaying and neutering. By doing so, they hope to help slow the spread of deadly diseases and the overpopulation of unwanted dogs, leading to a happier, healthier community for both pets and people.

As a foster-based rescue, there's no need for a brick-and-mortar facility. handled Everything is through appointments and volunteers. To raise the profiles of the animals in their care, PfP routinely organizes meet-and-greet events with various local businesses where people can come in and interact potential family members with cold, wet noses and four fuzzy paws.

When Seitz started, her goal was to acquire a mobile spay/neuter unit to address the myriad of accidental and unwanted litters Tucson is regularly inundated with. In the meantime, when all of the litters coming in had parvo, she recognized the need to offer affordable vaccines as she worked toward attaining a truck.

"I've wanted a mobile unit since day one and started with the rescue to earn the trust of the community and get our name out there," she explained. FYI, Pathways is still pursuing the dream of attaining a mobile unit, if you'd like to contribute and help make that dream a reality.

The desire to see that come to fruition is two-pronged, Seitz believes the

importance of spaying and neutering isn't JUST about preventing litters. There are certain conditions that intact animals can develop that the procedures could possibly negate or lower the incidence of, she explained. They include various cancer risks and behavioral issues, among other problems.

The most sought-after vaccine for dogs visiting the clinics is the DAPP vaccine, which stands for distemper, adenovirus, parainfluenza, and parvovirus. And this year, parvo was everywhere, according to Seitz, with all of the shelters having to reckon with it. "If people do what they're supposed to when they're supposed to, vaccines generally work well," she informed us. Seitz urges everyone to get their dogs vaccinated to stem the spread.

Parvo is a highly contagious and potentially fatal virus that causes severe vomiting, diarrhea, and dehydration. The DAPP vaccine is considered an essential part of a dog's core vaccination schedule. At PfP, the shots are \$10 apiece and given two weeks apart, but not more than 30 days, if you can't get back in at the two-week point. Four shots are needed in total.

While there is no definitive cure for canine parvo just vet, timely diagnosis and care can lead to recovery, with survival rates said to be as high as 80%-90% with hospitalization. The treatment to date has involved intensive supportive care that includes IV fluids to combat dehydration, antivomiting and diarrhea meds, antibiotics prevent secondary bacterial infections, and nutritional support.



A newer treatment known as monoclonal antibody therapy is said to help block the virus from replicating, thereby improving survival rates. As of August 2025, it was announced that Elanco's Canine Parvovirus Monoclonal Antibody treatment been conditionally approved by the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) for use when treating canine parvovirus. Pathways is obviously interested in any cure.

Curious about the increase in parvo cases, we contacted Dr. Lisa Shubitz, DVM, with U of A's Valley Fever Center for Excellence. As one of the scientists responsible for the

upcoming Valley Fever vaccine for canines, she knows a thing or two about viruses. She shared this:




"Regarding parvo, most of the parvo is related to lack of vaccination, not just of individual animals but of populations of dogs. The vaccine hesitancy in humans often extends to their pets, despite the fact that parvo is a fatal or very expensive disease in puppies and dogs, and nearly 100% preventable by vaccination."

She provided a link to an American Animal Hospital Association article on parvo vaccines, saying the information was consistent with previous research she had heard about. To view it, go to

If you're wondering whatever happened to the Valley Fever vaccine, we're told that while the regulatory wheels turn slowly, she believes they are near the finish line for USDA approval. Shubitz added that a live

avirulent fungal vaccine is truly a frontier product with many complexities.



Besides the four main drive-thru clinics conveniently located around town offering distemper/parvo, bordetella, feline FVRCP, microchips, and nail trims, PfP has recently begun collaborating with Bark n Berry for a walk-in clinic option, rather than a drive-thru, due to the ice cream parlor's location. Check the rescue's website for days, times, and locations nearest you.

Pathways for Paws would love to have more fosters and volunteers for help with any number of tasks, including updating their website. If you're interested, they'd be extremely grateful for your assistance.

Gone But Not Forgotten: TPD K-9 Raven Update

s some of you may recall, in October of 2023, a K-9 with the Tucson Police Department was shot while responding to a call involving an armed man at Reid Park suffering from an emotional health crisis. While mental health professionals attempted to de-escalate the situation over the phone, TPD officers rushed to the park to find the man and ordered him to drop his weapon.

During protracted negotiations,

the individual suddenly dashed to an exposed area of the park where he began to open fire, shooting police dog Raven in the process. Three of the officers on scene returned fire, wounding the man before he was taken into custody and transported to the hospital. Raven, a 3-year-old male German shepherd who began his career with the TPD just a few months earlier, was simultaneously rushed to the VCA Valley Animal Hospital and Emergency Center with life-threatening injuries.

TPD noted at the time that the VCA Valley Animal Hospital team worked tirelessly to perform life-saving surgery on him. After learning that he was in stable condition, they gratefully added in a statement, "Thanks to the incredible work by Dr. Chirco, Dr. Perino, Dr. Chauvet, Dr. Saulnier-Boyd, Dr. Pashaian and techs Andrea, Cassidy, Bailey, Maddie, Diana, Emily, Gemma, Cait, Ro, Jessy, Autumn, and Perla, Raven was able to survive his injuries."

But Raven had a long way to go in regaining his health and ultimately passed away on July 5, 2025, as a result of his injuries. We were able to speak to Sqt. Richard Legarra about the incident and learn a little more about Raven, the K-9 unit in general, and the vests the dogs wear while working. Legarra, who's been the head of the unit just shy of two years, is also a SWAT team leader and was there the night Raven was shot.

Raven was one of eight K-9s with the Tucson Police Department at the time of the shooting. Currently, there are nine dogs. Only three breeds are selected for use in the program. They are Belgian Malinois, German shepherds, and Dutch shepherds. They receive constant training from day one and throughout their careers with the TPD K-9 Unit, but a minimum of eight weeks of training is required before they begin duty. The animals live with their handlers and are generally assigned to them for the length of their careers.

Raven came from Adlerhorst International LLC, a provider of police service dogs and canine training to law enforcement agencies worldwide.

The person who shot Raven took a plea agreement and was held accountable for interfering with a police dog. Oddly enough, they are not considered law enforcement personnel in the court system but working dogs, so the penalties are not the same as shooting an officer. Since it is no longer an open case, no further charges will be brought against the defendant in connection with Raven's death more than two years ago.

A memorial service was held on August 5 of this year at the police academy located on Wilmot Road. A private

affair, members of the Service Dog Unit and their immediate families were in attendance, as well as members of the executive leadership team and the department's SWAT team, along with some additional K-9 handlers from other agencies who were invited.

Around the same time, it was announced on social media that the department was the recipient of new ballistic vests, saying, "The Service Dog Unit would like to thank The Alvernon-Grant Initiative (AGI) for their generous donation that helped purchase two new custom ballistic vests. Their donation will help keep K-9 Ranger and K-9 Hondo safe. Both have been outfitted with K-9 Storm Inc. ballistic vests. All of our K-9s wear ballistic protection while working."

Legarra informed us that vests are custom-made for each dog and that they can't order a vest until the animal is 2 years old because they generally aren't finished growing until then. As you're likely wondering, Raven, being a new dog with the department, hadn't received their vest vet.

Curious, we asked about the efficacy of the vests for dogs as compared to humans. In other words, are they as efficient and reliable as vests for their two-legged counterparts, considering the materials used? The answer is that dog vests are rated for handgun caliber while human vests are rated for rifle caliber, which has a more powerful impact. The reason for this is that the materials used for humans are far too heavy and bulky to work with the slight frame of a dog.

On a final note, Sgt. Legarra wanted indebted to them and we take care

to say: "These dogs are absolutely amazing. On more than one occasion, a dog has saved my life. We are

of them accordingly, both during their working career and after. They are incredible animals who deserve the best."





Healing with Hooves: The Therapeutic Power of Donkeys

Story Inspired by Genie Joseph The Human-Animal Connection

hen people think of therapy animals, dogs horses come to mind, but donkeys are quietly making their mark as some of the most effective and empathetic therapy partners around. With their gentle nature, intuitive sensitivity, and steady pace, donkeys offer a unique kind of emotional connection that benefits both humans and the animals themselves.

Donkeys have an uncanny ability sense human to emotions. Their calm demeanor curious personalities help people who struggle with anxiety, trauma, grief,

or developmental challenges. Unlike horses, donkeys tend to move slowly and deliberately, which creates a sense of safety for those who may feel intimidated by larger animals. Their patient presence encourages mindfulness. so participants must slow down to match the donkey's rhythm, and be fully present in the moment.



For children with autism, veterans coping with PTSD, or individuals in recovery. this quiet interaction fosters trust and builds confidence. Grooming, walking, or simply standing beside a donkey can lower blood pressure, ease tension, and create genuine emotional breakthroughs.

The benefits go both ways. Many therapy donkeys come from rescue situations, and through this work, they rediscover trust in humans. Regular interaction, affection, and gentle handling help them heal from neglect or fear, giving them renewed purpose and emotional balance.

Donkey-assisted therapy programs such as The Human-Animal Connection,

also educate communities about the species' intelligence and emotional depth, challenging old stereotypes that label donkeys as stubborn or lesser animals. In truth, their strength lies in patience, empathy, and the quiet power to help humans heal. "Our therapy donkeys work with people of all ages," says Genie Joseph. animal communicator and event organizer. "They teach us how to heal, how to trust again, and how to simply be in the moment."

Whether in a structured therapy program or a casual visit at a sanctuary, the connection between

donkeys and people proves that healing doesn't always come from words, it often begins with a bray, a nuzzle, and a heartbeat at your side.



hat appens when an English teacher with a passion for animals plants the seeds of animal welfare into the minds of high schoolers? You get the THMS Animal Rescue Group! Established in 2002 by Tucson High Magnet School faculty member Miriam Rosa, the group raises money for sick and injured animals at Pima Animal Care Center (PACC).

Described as "a saint" by Cecelia Garcia, the group's co-sponsor and gallery curator, Rosa is known for being a humble person who has spent her entire life giving back. Her good works include volunteering with women's shelters, soup kitchens, and other worthy deeds. Among them is her previous work with PACC, where she helped facilitate adoptions for many years. She also sells books on eBay to raise money for the Humane Society of Southern Arizona.

Garcia joined her at the school three years ago and says that everything Miriam does, she does for someone else. Like all truly humble people, Rosa feels no need for recognition, but Cecelia believes otherwise. Working together as a team, they created a logo that includes her dog, Minnie, and Rosa's dog, Baby Bear.

The program has helped Tucson teens recognize the overwhelming need



community involvement surrounding the homeless pet problem and the myriad challenges that arise from it.

The group, which regularly meets on Wednesdays during the school year, varies in size from 15 to 20 students, some with an interest in veterinary science. While THMS teaches kids ranging from the 9th through the 12th grade, the members, who are predominantly seniors, are often comprised of siblings, friends, or couples. "They always drag friends along for crafting projects," Garcia

laughingly noted.

As for crafts, they are part of their fundraising efforts, as well as their parking program, where event goers in the downtown area park in the school's lots. Charging \$5, plus the sale of bottled water, this component is integral to their success because it's their biggest money maker by far.

"While crafts account for a smaller percentage of our funding," Garcia explained, "the rest is raised through our parking program. The lots are located on 8th Street and 6th Street, and occasionally, we'll use the Roskruge parking lot. It was Miriam's idea.'

The annual Made in Tucson event and the popular Pima Pet Parade provide their most significant returns for their efforts. The group would appreciate anyone willing to promote the Park Program during events.

crafts sold on the school grounds three times a year, including homecoming and Valentine's Day.



They consist of Croc charms and handmade bracelets, buttons, origami flowers made from craft paper, and flower and butterfly rings fashioned from super plush, brightly colored pipe cleaners. The bracelets, made of beads using bracelet-making kits, were inspired by Taylor Swift's friendship bracelet trend. They also create woven or knotted bracelets.

The THMS Animal Rescue Group frequently has educational guest speakers accompanied by animal friends for students to pet, play with, or hold. Some examples include Sol Dog Lodge, Southern Arizona Reptile Rescue, Southern Arizona Cat Rescue, Hunter's Kitten Lounge, Tucson Action Team (TAT), Southwest Oasis Lab Rescue, Friends of PACC, and AZ Heartfelt Hounds.

These visits are a huge hit with the students, who are known for enthusiastically asking, "When do we get to go out and rescue animals?" To date, the largest organization to visit has been the U of A Veterinary College. The kids would appreciate more folks in the rescue community coming in to speak with them about ways to get involved or to give demonstrations.

Lilly, 17: "I joined Tucson High's Animal Rescue Group because I've always had a passion for helping animals, and this club felt like the perfect way to make a difference locally. Out of all the clubs at THMS, this one stood out because of the heart and

dedication I saw from both the members and the sponsors, especially Miriam and Cecelia, who made everyone feel welcomed and inspired.

Keep Your Dogs Away from These Holiday Foods!

ne of the greatest parts of the holiday season is the food! While humans can indulge in all sorts of delicious treats this time of year, it's important to understand that some of these foods are dangerous for dogs.

As you bustle through the kitchen this holiday season, be sure to keep a close eye on your pup! This is just a short list of common holiday foods that can be harmful to dogs. For a full list of foods to avoid, we recommend visiting the ASPCA Poison Control website.

Chocolate

All chocolate, including dark or baking chocolate, can be dangerous for dogs. The theobromine in chocolate can cause reactions like vomiting, diarrhea, panting, excessive thirst, urination, tremors, and seizures.

Candy and Candy Wrappers

Candies often contain xylitol, which is a sugar alcohol that is extremely poisonous to dogs. Xylitol can cause a sudden drop in blood sugar, leading to loss of coordination and collapse. Which can lead to liver failure.

Even if the candy itself doesn't contain xylitol, the wrappers can be just as dangerous. Dogs love to chew on things, and if they ingest foil or cellophane wrappers, they can suffer from intestinal blockages.

Animal Bones

While it may seem like a good idea to give your dog a bone to chew on, it can actually be hazardous. Animal bones can splinter and cause lacerations or blockages in your dog's digestive tract.

Dairy

Many dogs are lactose intolerant, and consuming dairy can lead to vomiting, diarrhea, and abdominal pain. It's best to keep the cheese plate away from your pup!

Nuts

Some nuts are safe for dogs in small quantities, and many dogs enjoy nut butter treats. However, some nuts are toxic to dogs or

pose a choking risk and should not be fed to dogs. Avoid giving your dog macadamias, pistachios, black walnuts, and almonds.

The best way to keep your dog safe during the holidays is to make sure they don't have access to any human food. Keep an eye on them while you're cooking, and be sure to put leftovers away where they can't reach them.If you think your dog has ingested something they shouldn't have, contact your local animal hospital immediately or call ASPCA Poison Control at

The Secret Life of PACC: Behind the Scenes of Lifesaving

hen people think of Pima Animal Care Center, the most common focus is on the place to go if you want to adopt a dog or a cat. And while that's true, PACC serves the community in many more ways. Some of that is 'back-of-house' services that many people are not even aware that we're providing. And yet the work being done is critical to PACC being the regional animal welfare leader.



One of the back-ofhouse functions PACC is our medical clinic. With the funding support that comes from both Pima County and from Friends of PACC, we have on staff 4 veterinarians, between 15 20 vet techs at any given time, and staff that is dedicated to community events through our mobile medical unit, Karen's Karing Van (KKV). While that may sound like an army of vet professionals, given our vast regional responsibility, we keep that medical crew busy every day of the week.

Every animal that's adopted from PACC leaves fully altered (spayed or neutered) and vaccinated. That means our vets performing 40+ alterations daily. PACC also has over 1,500 dogs and cats out in foster. As foster animals, their medical care continues to be our responsibility. The clinic schedules 10-15 foster animals daily for any number of ongoing conditions. medical And with that number of foster animals out the community,

some inevitably come in with emergency medical needs. We see roughly 10 foster emergencies daily.



In addition to all of those medical interventions that are performed at the shelter, our clinic is out in the community multiple times weekly. The KKV was provided to PACC by the Friends of PACC. It is literally a mobile surgery center that we take all over the county performing spay/neuter and other wellness procedures. We realize that the cost of veterinary care can

be prohibitive for many people. The KKV mobile clinics are our way of offering spay/neuter surgeries free of charge to those who simply cannot afford the cost of private veterinary care. Everyone wins from this service – low-income animal owners gain the veterinary care their pet deserves, and we limit future litters that may have otherwise ended up in the shelter.

When you think of PACC, it is correct to think of the many adoptable pups (and cats) we have at the shelter. And it is also proper to remember the PACC medical team that serves largely behind the scenes, conducting life-saving procedures and preparing the animals in our care to go home and become your new forever family member. PACC would not be what we are without the dedication of the PACC clinic staff. Each time you interact with your PACC pet, give a nod of thanks to the team who works 7 days each week in support of our animals' health.

Food Banks Aren't Just for People: How the Southern Arizona Animal Food Bank is Keeping Pets Fed

ur animals are part of the family, providing companionship, stress relief, and emotional support. Some families in Tucson might not be able to feed their animals. They may be homeless and without resources; perhaps they're a veteran, just getting back on their feet. The elderly, the infirmed—anyone who is struggling to decide whether to eat or choose instead to feed their beloved pets—might wonder where they'll find help.

The Southern Arizona Animal Food Bank (SAAFB) is here to fill that gap. Created in 2015, the mother-daughter team of Donna and Margaux DeConcini established a donation and distribution center, initially for horses and later for dogs, cats, and other family pets. Donna recently relocated the store to 4444 E. Grant Avenue, Suite 116, Tucson, 85712, where she serves all of southern Arizona.

It Takes a Village

If you've ever met Donna, you know that the SAAFB runs on her determination and drive. The organization is proud to have a tight-knit group of volunteers, each filling specific roles. Millie Hartman runs the Artisan Markets for SAAFB, recruiting vendors and generating traffic for craft goods whose proceeds go back to the animal food bank. David Zinke, director of food distribution, does inventory, and Nick Morelli helps with deliveries.

"We have too many people to thank, but I want to acknowledge Randi Holzman, Leslie Bellis, Cathy Leroy, Shorty

Wilconson, Krista Miller, Troy Dainty, and Zac Fisher." Those folks and more keep the store humming and the animals fed, she said, but the need is evergrowing for more volunteers.

"The real issue we need to address is limiting the population of animals in Southern Arizona," Donna said. "We're distributing 10,000 pounds a month to animal families in need, but it's getting harder to keep up with demand. That's why we appreciate our donors so very much, as well as our volunteers."

Partnerships for Pets

Donna would be the first one to say that SAAFB can't do this job of feeding hungry animals alone. She's passionate about the topic of spaying and neutering to control the animal population, reducing the need for donated food. To that end, SAAFB works closely with Tucson Action Team (TAT), another nonprofit that supports the health and well-being of animals in Tucson. Their mission is to advocate for, promote, and protect the rights and well-being of dogs. Together

with Donna, they spread the word about low-cost spaying and neutering opportunities for families that cannot afford the typical cost of service.

Other SAAFB alliances include the Humane Society of Arizona, the Hermitage Cat Shelter, Gospel Rescue Mission, Sister Jane Women's Shelter, and Santa Cruise Soup Kitchen. Veterinarians, too, are partners in the cause.

How it Works

When someone needs food for their pet, they can fill out an application form at the new store. Office hours are currently 11 a.m. to 4 p.m. on Monday, Tuesday, Friday, and Saturday. Once the request is approved, applicants

receive a 30-day supply of pet food. Due to the increased need for animal food assistance, applications per household are limited to four times per year.

Donors Offer Critical Support

"At this time of year, we hope people will consider SAAFB in their year-end giving," said Donna, citing the organization's dependence on monetary gifts from donors to continue serving animals in need. "We so appreciate those whose hearts lead them to SAAFB and those who have a special affinity for animals. Most people do!" she said.

To generate interest and contributions, Donna and her team have come up with a variety of ways for people to give to SAAFB, whether that's a monetary gift or donations of goods for the animals. One way is to host a holiday party where, instead of a gift exchange, people donate food, treats, or pet toys to SAAFB. "We even have companies that host a competition, and the department that generates the most donations gets to have a kettle corn and shaved ice party on us," she said.

She spoke about the scope of donations SAAFB receives. "We get everything from dog and cat food to medications, toys, beds, crates, and household items," she said. The food bank accepts gently used items as well as nonexpired pet food from owners whose beloved animals have "crossed the rainbow bridge." The act of giving back to SAAFB in honor of their pets seems to provide some comfort to those who have lost their pets. Donors are invited to add their pet's name to the Rainbow Bridge in the store.

The SAAFB does its best to meet demand, but sometimes things can get tight. Donna is proud

of the fact that they've never turned anyone away, but she emphasized that SAAFB cannot sustain itself without the support of the community. "We serve all of Southern Arizona, including Tucson, Three Points, Wilcox, and the Pascua Yaqui and Tohono O'odham communities," Donna said. "With the help of our donors, volunteers, and partners, we can make a difference with all the animals we love.

Having a Safe, Happy & Healthy Holiday Season

The holiday season is a time of joy, laughter, and family, furry ones included. But amid the celebrations, the sights, smells, and routines in our homes change dramatically. From rich foods to sparkling décor, it's easy for our pets to get into trouble without us realizing it.

Taking a few proactive steps can make all the difference in keeping your pets safe, healthy, and calm through the hustle and bustle of the holidays.



Common Toxic Holiday Plants

Even small nibbles can cause illness:

- Poinsettia
- Mistletoe
- Holly
- Amaryllis
- Lily



Poisonous items: Certain foods, plants, and decorations can be toxic or dangerous if chewed or swallowed.

Too much of a good thing: Avoid sharing fatty foods, bones, or rawhide treats. Moderation matters!

Holiday decorations: Tinsel, ornaments, ribbons, and cords can all become choking or entanglement hazards.

Overstimulation: The holidays can be chaotic. Practice calm listening and obedience in busy environments.

Poisonous Foods to Watch Out For

Keep these foods out of paw's reach:

- Chocolate
- High-fat or salty foods (gravy, ham drippings, etc.)
- Garlic
- Grapes and raisins
- Xylitol (found in sugar-free gum and candy)
- Onions



Pet First Aid and CPR: A Lifesaving Skill

Accidents can happen when we least expect them. Knowing how to perform pet CPR or basic first aid can make all the difference if your dog chokes, swallows something dangerous, or goes into distress.

In a Pet CPR Course, You'll Learn How To:

- Recognize different types of collapse or unconsciousness
- Monitor and identify signs of shock
- Identify signs of cardiac arrest
- Check for a pulse
- Give rescue breaths and chest compressions
- Confidently and effectively administer CPR

These classes are open to everyone, no prerequisites required and are available both online and in person. Even a basic understanding of first aid can buy precious time in an emergency until you reach a vet.

Training and Behavior Prep Before Guests Arrive

A little preparation can prevent big problems once the doorbell starts ringing. The excitement of visitors, decorations, and extra energy can easily overwhelm pets.
